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Hickory Fields Project Begins

The Hermitage Planning Commission approved subdivision and land development plans for the initial phase of the Hickory Fields project on January 13, marking the beginning of the redevelopment of the former Shenango Valley Mall property. Flicore LLC, developer of the mall property, presented a Sketch Plan delineating 11 parcels on the 54-acre mall property and detailing extensive pedestrian facilities and an interconnecting street grid system, special landscaping features and open space areas.

Four Land Development Plans for the initial development phase which were approved by the Hermitage Planning Commission reveal the construction of an approximately 128,660 sq. ft. building to house a national big box retailer, along with Chick-fil-A, Chili's and Longhorn Steak House restaurants.

The City of Hermitage has engaged SmithGroup, an award-winning national design firm, to provide recommendations and concepts for the development of the City Center consistent with the Hermitage 2030 Comprehensive Plan.

The Hickory Fields announcement marks a turning point in the history of the Shenango Valley Mall property. The once thriving mall suffered from consumer trends that have swept across the nation and which led to the loss of mall anchors Macy's and Sears, which closed in 2016. This led to disinvestment in the mall building, the loss of nearly \$250,000 in annual property tax revenues for local taxing bodies, and a significant decline in retail and hospitality jobs in the community. The Hickory Fields project will not

only reestablish the tax base, but it will also involve private investments in excess of \$100,000,000 in the property and the creation of hundreds of new jobs in the retail and hospitality sectors.

"We are excited to kick off the Hickory Fields project and welcome national brands like Chick-fil-A, Chili's and Longhorn, along with a big box national retailer, to our community," remarked Duane Piccirilli, President, Hermitage Board of Commissioners. "These brands will satisfy the demands of customers from across the region while providing significant job opportunities for area residents and stabilizing the tax base in our community."

The project was spurred by \$5.5 million in Commonwealth of Pennsylvania investments providing funds for demolition of the mall building, site preparation and the construction of road and pedestrian infrastructure. The state investment was an integral part in attracting Flicore to pursue redevelopment of the property. Hermitage City Manager, Gary Hinkson, thanked local legislators for their part in spurring the development. "We are grateful to State Senator Michele Brooks who was instrumental in securing the state funding needed to realize this project and to State Representative Parke Wentling for his strong support of the project," Hinkson commented. "In the absence of their involvement and support the Hickory Fields project would not be possible."

"I'm happy to see plans for the initial phase of the Hickory Fields project unveiled," stated State Senator Michele Brooks.

"It is a prime example of how state funds can leverage a large private investment that will transform our community through a mixed-use development that will provide jobs for our residents and dining, shopping and entertainment that will work to attract new families and businesses to the area."

"I am excited for the launch of the Hickory Fields project," said State Representative Parke Wentling. "This project will not only provide shopping and dining opportunities that our community has long desired but will ultimately lead to the development of a walkable City Center that will provide amenities for the enjoyment of people of all ages and

accommodate a variety of gathering opportunities."

And there is more to come. The Hickory Fields project will include future phases involving the development of the remaining seven parcels as well as the City Center. "Hickory Fields is a multi-year project, and we expect construction on the initial four parcels to begin later this year with store openings occurring sometime in 2026," Hinkson stated. "Future phases will follow the presentation on January 13 and we look forward to the full buildout," Hinkson concluded.

City of Hermitage 2025 Budget

On December 18, 2024, the Hermitage Board of Commissioners approved the City's 2025 budgets which total \$24.7M, including the General and Sewer Funds. There is no increase in taxes and staffing levels will be maintained. It is anticipated that revenues in 2025 will remain stable, enabling the city to sustain existing services and capital programs. City officials place a high priority on maintaining a sound infrastructure system and several projects will be undertaken in 2025 including:

- Phase III of Block 7 of the Neighborhood Investment Program. Fern St. from Greenwood Ave. to Baker Run (east of Baker Ave.) will have the old pavement milled off with roadway base repairs made and then repaved. Also, new subsurface stormwater facilities and new street signs will be installed.
- The 2025 Capital Paving Program will consist of paving Tiffany Ln., Fran Ln., Lee Run Rd., Briarwood Rd., Anderwood Dr. and Monticello Blvd. These streets will have the existing pavement milled off, necessary roadway base repairs made and new pavement and street signs installed. Elsewhere in the City several streets will be sealcoated and line painting done, with the exact locations yet to be determined.
- Wheatland Neighborhood Paving Program will consist of milling off old pavement and repaving streets in the residential neighborhoods. The exact streets to be improved are yet to be determined.
- Wheatland Community Center will have a new roof installed.
- Lorenwood Drive Improvement/Athletic Complex Trails will construct trails from Lorenwood Dr. into the Hermitage Athletic Complex (HAC) and add trails inside the HAC.
- Hermitage Athletic Complex Pickleball Courts – Nine pickleball courts will be constructed at the HAC along with a parking lot and additional trails.
- Hermitage Athletic Complex Softball Field #2 Improvements will include a press box, bullpens, an outfield warning track and drainage improvements.
- Traffic Signals at the intersection of Council Ave. and Broadway Ave. will be replaced and programmed to coordinate with signals at Mercer Ave. and Broadway Ave.
- North Hermitage Rd. Pedestrian Improvement Project will construct sidewalks along the west side of North Hermitage Rd. from Highland Rd. to the Walmart development.
- Rodney White Olympic Park Playground Improvement Project will replace the accessible playground equipment and surface at RWOP.
- South Neshannock Rd. Sewer Extension Project will extend the municipal sanitary sewer system from E. State St. to Miller Rd. and to parts of Virginia Rd. and Miller Rd., adding 92 properties to the system and opening vacant land for development.
- Hermitage Little League Concession & Multipurpose Facility Project will construct a new building that will house concessions, ADA restrooms, first aid, umpires room, a multipurpose room and storage area.
- City Center Median Beautification Project will remove the wide concrete median on N. Hermitage Rd. north of E. State St. and replace it with landscaping.

Other capital expenditures include 2 new utility vehicles for the Fire Department, 8 new police vehicles, new computers in the Planning and Inspection/Code offices, a new street sweeper, new large grounds mower with attachments and capital facility maintenance improvements at the Municipal Building.

2024 Year in Review with a Look Ahead

The City of Hermitage capped off 2024 by receiving the Community Growth Award presented by the Shenango Valley Chamber of Commerce. The award recognized the collaboration between city officials and staff, business leaders, entrepreneurs, and the community in growing the economy and quality of life of Mercer County's largest city. Now, the stage is set for transformational growth in the city with numerous vital projects slated.

The former Borough of Wheatland officially became part of the City of Hermitage at the beginning of last year, following a successful municipal merger. Pennsylvania Lieutenant Governor Austin Davis marked the occasion with a visit and tour of Wheatland Tube, which has committed nearly \$100 million in plant modernization upgrades. The Wheatland neighborhood will also receive city and state investments in 2025 for building enhancements to the Wheatland Community Center, a full reconstruction of the Broadway/Council Avenue traffic signal, sewer upgrades in the industrial area, and planned roadway projects.

Building projects and openings abounded in 2024. Mercer County Community Federal Credit Union completed a nearly \$5 million headquarters in the city center and Joy Cone started construction of a new 220,000 square foot cookie plant with over \$40 million in private investment leading to 130 new jobs. New openings included restaurants and eateries like Blue Collar Betty's, Cianci's, Giavonna's Gourmet Coffee, Hunger Station, Jersey Mike's, MP Coney Island, and Starbucks, and service businesses like Envy Hair and Nail Salon and Express 80 Truck Repair.

The marquee project for 2025 is the redevelopment of the

Shenango Valley Mall property, a multiyear endeavor. Flicore, LLC, will construct new buildings for national brand restaurant and retail businesses, following demolition of the mall. The city plans to develop outdoor community space to host events and to provide a variety of amenities for all ages. The overall project will exceed \$100 million and result in hundreds of new jobs.

The city continues investments in neighborhoods and recreational spaces. About \$1.5 million was committed to neighborhood road and stormwater projects in 2024, with a similar amount allocated for 2025. A sewer expansion project will reach 92 residential properties along S. Neshannock, Miller and Virginia roads.

The Hermitage Athletic Complex continues to expand in its recreational opportunities. In 2024, PennDOT Secretary Mike Carroll visited the complex to discuss two state grants that will provide trail access and expansion. Also, last year a new Dek Hockey facility was opened for use. A state grant and city funds will build 9 outdoor pickleball courts, and additional parking and pedestrian facilities. The complex will host Penn State Shenango's new Women's Softball program and a new multipurpose building will be constructed at the adjacent Hermitage Little League complex.

Residential development is a focus for the city. In 2024, multifamily housing was added to the zoning at LindenPointe Technical Park and a first-time homebuyers assistance program was launched. The city looks to spur further housing development to meet demand fueled by a growing economy and enhanced quality of life.

Winter Street Maintenance

The City of Hermitage Street Department provides winter maintenance, including plowing snow and applying salt and calcium chloride, on over 98 miles of city streets, including over 5 miles in the Wheatland neighborhood. In addition, in exchange for an annual payment, the city provides winter maintenance on the following state roads:

- North & South Neshannock Road (city line at Clark to city line at Shenango Twp.)
- North & South Keel Ridge Road (Valley View Road to city line at Shenango Twp.)
- Dutch Lane (entire length)
- Lamor Road (city line at Sharpsville to city line at Jefferson Twp.)
- Ohio Street (Church Street to South

Stateline Road)

- Highland Road (North Hermitage Road to city line at Sharon)
- Maple Drive (East State Street to Freeway)
- Mercer Avenue (Freeway to city line at Farrell)
- Mercer Avenue (Farrell city line to Broadway Avenue)
- Council Avenue (Mercer Avenue to Broadway Avenue)
- Church Street (entire length)
- Thornton Avenue (city line at Sharon to Forker Avenue)

The Street Department also provides some winter maintenance on Buhl Park roadways, and the Building & Grounds staff assists with work on the driveways and parking lots at city parks

and at all city buildings. City streets and state roads are divided into winter maintenance routes where the work is accomplished, when at full staffing, with 11 large trucks and 3 small trucks, all equipped with salt spreaders and plows and operated by city employees. The department uses, on average, approximately 5,000 tons of road salt each winter.

The city reminds property owners and residents that during winter weather events vehicles should not be parked along streets. Vehicles parked on the street serve to reduce the effectiveness and efficiency of winter maintenance efforts and can result in vehicles being "plowed in" during snow removal efforts.

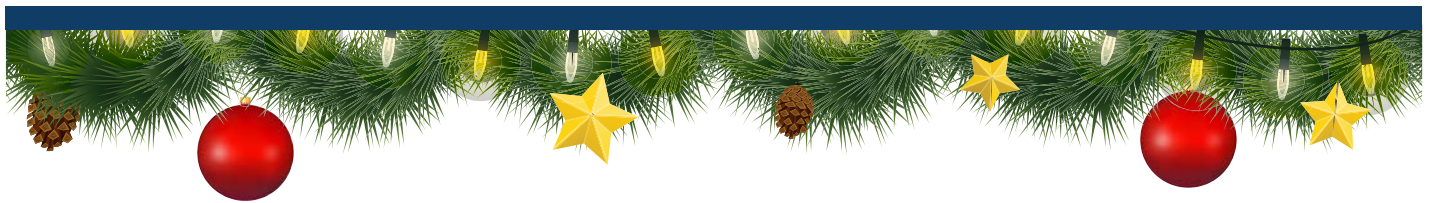

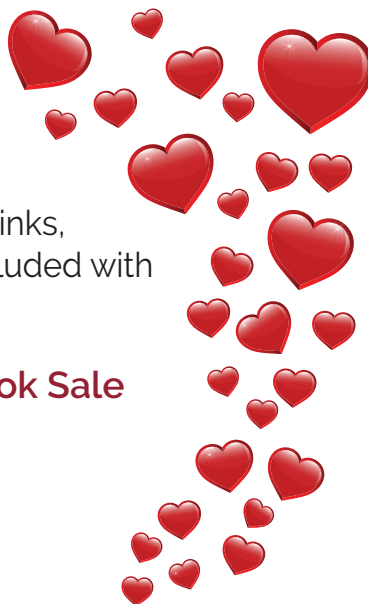



Forms to be uploaded during the registration process: State Birth Certificate, Immunization Record, Proof of Guardianship (if not biological parent), Proof of Residence (deed, lease, two current utility bills, property tax bill) **ALL INFORMATION MUST BE CURRENT.**

Please note: if you do not have access to a computer, contact our Central Administrative Offices at 724-981-8750, ext 6000 to schedule an appointment. You will need to bring the above documents with you to the appointment in order to complete your child's registration.

Kindergarten Screening Process:

Our Kindergarten registration process includes an academic screening for kindergarten readiness, a speech/language screening, and vision screening. Our kindergarten screening will take place March 5-6, 2025, by appointment only. All students must be registered **PRIOR** to attending the Kindergarten Screening. Please go to the Hermitage School District website to register for your appointment or call Mrs. Cindy Foster at 724-981-8750, ext. 5001. We ask that no more than 2 parents/guardians attend with each child. If you cannot make your scheduled appointment time, please call to reschedule.

Other Requirements and Important Information:

BULK Trash Collection Dates - SPRING 2025

Aiken Refuse, the new curbside provider of solid waste, recycling, and yard waste collection services in the city of Hermitage, will be providing customers with a SPRING BULK trash cleanup. The collection schedule will be similar to last Fall with some minor adjustments. Please see below for details on when to expect your SPRING BULK trash collection to occur. Aiken will only collect bulk trash from residents who are current on their quarterly garbage bill. All items should be placed at the curb by the Sunday night before your scheduled pick-up week. Bulk items will be collected separately from your regular collection and will be picked up at some point throughout the week depending on routes. The following is the pick-up week schedule based upon your normal garbage collection day:

Monday & Tuesday regular collection day - Residents should place their items out to the curb by no later than Sunday, March 30 - For collection starting the week of March 31 - April 3.

Wednesday & Thursday regular collection day - Residents should place their items out to the curb no later than Sunday, April 6 - for collection starting the week of April 7-10

Accepted Items

Lawn Chairs, Lamps, Bicycles, Carpet Rolls (no more than 4 feet in length), Appliances (large and small), Furniture, Tables, Washers, Dryers, Stoves, Window glass, Mattresses (any size), Freon - Air conditioners, dehumidifiers, refrigerators, and freezers must have their doors disabled and Freon removed and be properly tagged by a certified technician.

Food Waste to Energy Wayne Covert, WPC Superintendent, HMA Manager

The Hermitage Wastewater Treatment Plant transforms processed sewage and discarded food into renewable energy through anaerobic digestion. This process uses one thermophilic (131°F) and three mesophilic (96°F) digesters, where bacteria break down organic matter in the absence of oxygen, producing a mix of methane and carbon dioxide called biogas.

The biogas is captured in inflatable membranes and a Bio-Ball, with a storage capacity of 100,000 cubic feet. After drying and removing impurities like siloxane and hydrogen sulfide, the biogas is pressurized to 70 inches of water column (2.5 psi) and fed into a Combined Heat and Power (CHP) generator. This generator produces both electricity and heat for the digesters, generating around

65,000 cubic feet of biogas daily, which equates to 5,000 kWh of energy.

We process food waste from across the U.S., either de-packaging it on-site or unloading tanker shipments into our hydrolysis pit. By converting food waste into energy, we reduce landfill waste and methane emissions, lower electricity and natural gas costs for the plant, and generate revenue through tipping fees and recycling aluminum, cardboard, and pallets. Additionally, the process produces Class A biosolids, cutting landfill costs, and helps stabilize sewer rates, which have remained steady since 2013. Our innovative approach not only supports sustainability but also creates significant economic benefits, turning waste into a valuable resource.

Water Quality Corner

The City of Hermitage is committed to protecting and improving stream & river quality in our community and region. Every resident can help to preserve our environment and water resources.

When discussing polluted waterways, there are two types of pollutants: point source & non-point source pollutants. When there is a direct water contamination issue that can be followed, that is considered point source pollution. Nonpoint source pollution includes cars leaking motor oil,

littering, and fertilizer use. These items, along with many others, are sources of pollution that greatly impact the health of our waterways and can lead to long last effects including fish kills and hazards to human health.



From the Desk of the Treasurer



Hello Everyone,

I hope you had a nice Holiday season and are now enjoying the daytime hours increasing as each day goes by. January has greeted us with more winter like weather than last year. Hopefully it will warm up soon.

This is the time of year to take a break from property taxes. All unpaid taxes have been turned over to the County and the unpaid Per Capita bills have gone to Sharp Collections. Keep in mind that we only collect for current year taxes and they must be paid in our office by December 30th of each year, in order to keep from being filed for collection.

This is a good time of year to have your receipts handy to prepare your tax rebate if eligible. Forms will be available in our office if you don't receive one by mail, and they should be filed with your income taxes. Have you ever applied for the Homestead Exclusion on your residence? Generally, it's a

one-time application unless you have a change on your deed. Keep in mind that by law, you can only claim one Homestead Exclusion on the house in which you reside and are named on the deed.

The county has announced an increase on their portion of the county/city bill, while the city portion will remain at 5 mills. These bills will be mailed to you on March 1st.

This bill labeled County/City is one bill and does not require one check for the county portion and another check for the city portion. Please remit one check for the combined amount stated on your bill.

The Hermitage Police Department has seen a marked uptick in residents falling victim to scams, some involve criminals using local Cryptocurrency – Bitcoin ATM machines as a payment mechanism. Within the last several months, five Hermitage Victims had a combined total theft of approximately \$589,000 through various scams! Have a conversation with your parents, grandparents and friends

A government report in 2023 showed the vast majority of victims were over 60 years old. Last year Americans reported losing more than \$5.6 billion through fraud involving cryptocurrency. Pennsylvania ranks seventh worst in the Country.

The top three scams for that age range were;

1. Tech Support
2. Personal Data Breach
3. Confidence/Romance Scams

Scammers running some frauds will pressure you to pay them in cryptocurrency, something no legitimate business or government agency would do. Virtual money isn't backed by any government or central bank. Crypto investments are subject to far less regulatory protection than traditional investments and can be volatile. Crypto ATMs are favored by criminals for their anonymity, general lack of oversight, and difficulty tracing. They don't have the same legal protections as credit or debit cards and payments usually can't be reversed. Scammers sometimes falsely advertise individual retirement accounts as IRS-approved to make them

seem less risky. Don't invest in crypto with someone that sends you a text message, contacts you on social media or email and if someone says you owe a fee or payment and they tell you to directly go to a crypto ATM machine or buy gift cards, certainly it's a scam.

Red flags

- Claims that you'll make big money. Someone you don't know sends you a message out of the blue about an incredibly lucrative virtual currency investment opportunity involving no risk and surefire profits.
- Pressure to pay. A call, text, email or social media message claiming to be from a government agency, utility or other official body seeks a crypto payment, debt or fee.

How to protect yourself

- No legitimate business or government will ever email, text, or message you on social media to ask for money and they will never demand that you buy or pay with cryptocurrency or prepaid gift cards.
- Never click on a link from an unexpected text, email, or social media message, even if it seems to come from a company you know.
- Don't pay anyone who contacts you unexpectedly, demanding payment with cryptocurrency, prepaid gift cards or wire transfer.
- Never pay a fee to get a job. If someone asks you to pay upfront for a job or says to buy cryptocurrency, it's a scam.
- **Resist pressure to buy right now.**

Criminals often try to create a false sense of urgency around a supposedly red-hot cryptocurrency.

- **Check out any dealer before you buy.** It's not a good idea to invest in or trade virtual currencies on the advice of someone you've only dealt with online.
- **Do your research.** Thoroughly research any virtual currency platform or digital wallet provider before providing any credit card information, wiring money or disclosing sensitive personal data.
- **Carefully read any agreement.** They (similar to banks) likely will not accept responsibility for replacing your money if it is stolen or connected to a theft through manipulation.
- **If you own crypto, never share your "private keys"** — the long letter-and-number codes that enable you to access your virtual currency — with anyone. Keep them in a secure place.

What to do if you've been targeted by any scam-

- Submit a report to the FBI <https://www.ic3.gov/> (IC3) or contact your local FBI Field Office and provide as much information about the transaction as possible.
- Report it to your local police. To file any police report, call 911 or to report a not-in-progress incident, call the 24/7 Non-Emergency Dispatch Phone Number 724-662-6110
- File a report through, Report Fraud FTC <https://reportfraud.ftc.gov/>

From the Fire Chief

The Hermitage Volunteer Fire Department would like to wish everyone a happy and safe New Year. The Hermitage Volunteer Fire Department has mailed its annual truck fund drive packet out and encourages all the Hermitage residences and businesses to support and donate no matter how big or small your donation is. These funds will help secure the future of the fire department with the best equipment possible.

As I travel around our community, I have noticed an alarming amount of businesses and residences without addresses on their homes or businesses. The City of Hermitage Ordinance 9/8/1971; Chapter 4-103 states you must have at least a 4 inch in height number with the color contrasting with the background surface. It shall be affixed to the residence or

building or structure at the assigned address and must be visible from the street. If street side mailboxes are used, the number shall be affixed to the mailbox. Most of the time when you need some type of emergency services, time is of the most importance; why slow us down by not having an address visible. Trying to find an address in the darkness of the night can be like finding a needle in a haystack.

I cannot stress enough how important a visible address is for safety and security for you and your loved ones. Please do your part as a safety advocate for our community and make sure your address is visible from the street.

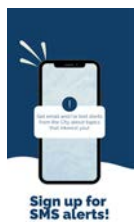
